

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
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One Health Global Architecture

- One Health was already on the international agenda, but COVID-19 reiterated its importance:
 - O Emphasis on disease spill over from animals to people that results in pandemic
 - Links between deforestation, climate change, biodiversity loss and disease emergence
 - Increasing number of multidimensional health, animal, water, energy, food systems transformation, food security, & pollution necessitate One Health collaboration, coordination, communication and capacity building
 - Increasing political commitment and international support for One Health
- November 2020: One Health High Level Expert Panel (OHHLEP)
 - February 2021 27th Tripartite Annual Executive Meeting: agreement to jointly develop a strategy and action plan to prevent future zoonotic pandemics through the One Health approach

One Health Definition

"One Health is an integrated, unifying approach that aims sustainably balance and optimize the health of people, animals (domestic wildlife) and ecosystems"



The One Health Quadripartite Collaboration

March 2022: unique opportunity for FAO, UNEP, WHO and WOAH (formerly OIE) to stand together as a global coalition to jointly drive change and achieve the transformations desired: the Quadripartite Collaboration



For a world better able to prevent, predict, detect, and respond to health threats and improve the health of humans, animals, plants, and the environment while contributing to sustainable development.

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
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The One Health Joint Plan of Action (OH JPA)



This Plan is global, comprehensive, and inclusive. It aims:

- to mainstream and operationalize One Health at global, regional, and national levels;
- support countries in establishing and achieving national targets and priorities for interventions;
- mobilize investment;
- promote a whole-of-society approach and enable collaboration, learning, and exchange across regions, countries, and sectors.

The OH JPA was officially launched in October 2022.

Action track 6: Integrating the Environment into One Health

Action track 5: Curbing the silent pandemic of Antimicrobial Resistance (AMR)

Implementation Guide for the OH JPA

Following the launch of the OH JPA in October 2022, development of the complimentary implementation guide began to support and translate the objectives and high-level activities into practical guidance that can be adapted to national level contexts.




Purpose and Scope of the Implementation Guide for the OH JPA

The Guide aims to provide countries with guidance on how to adopt and adapt the OH JPA according to the three pathways of the theory of change.

The Guide has an **inclusive** scope to allow each country to use it, regardless of its status on One Health development and implementation.

Stages to operationalize the OH JPA

- Map stakeholder groups, existing structures, activities, plans, and completed assessments related to One Health
- Identify priority gaps and opportunities

Stage 1: Situation analysis

Stage 2: Multisectoral coordination mechanism

 Establish or adapt a national multisectoral,
 One Health coordination mechanism

- Develop and adapt a costed One Health implementation framework and workplan, linking to existing plans
- Resource mobilization for One Health implementation frameworks
- Develop and adapt a monitoring, evaluation, and learning (MEL) framework

Stage 3: Implementation Planning Stage 4: mplementation

 Conduct activities and MFL

- Prepare annual reports on progress of One Health workplans
- Incorporate lessons learned from implementation activities
- Share lessons learned and best practices

Stage 5: Review, sharing, and incorporation of lessons learned

Asia-Pacific Regional Quadripartite Alliance Working Towards One Health Implementation in the Region

- Close collaboration with Quadripartite Secretariat
- Quadripartite and Partners Meeting on OH and OH JPA, 1-2 March 2023, Bangkok
 - Key outcome: Quadripartite Alliance should support an informal platform built on existing ones to facilitate sharing of information, good practices, case studies, crosssectoral collaboration and networking to improve communication and collaboration among OH stakeholders and countries
- Next step: Asia-Pacific Regional Stakeholder Workshop (countries):
 - To raise awareness of the OH JPA and its Guide
 - To support the Member States in taking advantage of the OH JPA and adapting the OH JPA Guide in line with their own strategies for operationalizing and implementing the One Health approach.



Messages to take home:

- The One Health Global architecture is moving forward
- A common vision and approach to collaborate, coordinate, communicate and implement are required
